Lawrence County Baseball League Now Has Five Teams, Hope For Sixth

RULES SCHEDULE COMMITTEE PICKED

The Lawrence County baseball league will start on Saturday May 9, according to an announcement today from the office of Alec Samuels, president of the league. There are five teams now holding franchises, with every indication that the sixth team will come into the fold.

The following teams are in the league—West, Hillsville, West Plains, Shermana Battery and Wampum. The sixth team will be picked from the following team: American Sheet and Tin Plate company, Standard Oil, Ross Brick, Archibald, Hines Valley, Seacrazo Coals, or the B. O. The sixth team is a matter of doubt awaiting meetings of the teams mentioned above.

W. G. Andrews, Pop Adams and Nick Navarre have been picked by President Samuels as a Rules Committee. The executive committee consists of Louis Park, Glenn, Clark, Socco and Alex Samuels.

It has been agreed upon to start the season on Saturday, May 9, at the Saturday afternoon games at 3 o'clock.

It is considered likely that the officials may decide to pick three more teams and make it an eight-team league. Some of the teams are the "Tens" and are to let the officials know as soon as possible if they desire to join the league.

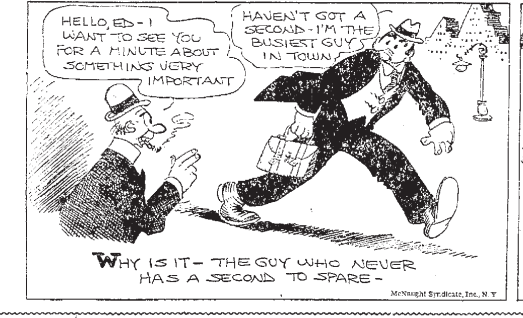

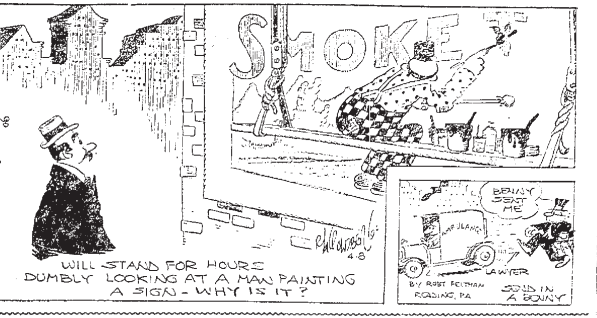

Boxing Bill Is Handed Pinchot

Fate Of 15-Round Championship Fights In State At Stake

(International News Service) HARRISBURG, April 2.—Governor Clifford Pinchot today laid the fate of 15-round boxing bouts with championships at stake.

Under the terms of a bill sponsored by Rep. N. E. Jaffee, Philadelphia, passed by the senate last night, 15 rounds limit, at which championships may be awarded would be permitted in Pennsylvania.

The measure, which already has passed the house, will be sent to the governor today for approval.

The bill provides in addition to length of bouts, that decisions of the two judges and the referee shall be of equal importance in deciding bouts. Under present rules, if the judges disagree on a decision, the verdict of the referee becomes final.

It is expected that under the Jaffee bill, which sports enthusiasts believe the governor will approve, disputes of decisions will be lessened.
