Junior B Leads In Annual Meet

Annual Inter-Class Track Meet For High School Classes Gets Underway Tuesday

Final Seven Events On Program To Be Staged Today; Meet Proves Exciting

Led by Andy Lasky, who scored 44 points, the Junior B class track team took the lead in the annual New Castle high school inter-class track and field meet which got under way Wednesday afternoon. The Junior B team scored 29 points to account for the lead. The Senior B class team with 18 points is second. The meet will be concluded this afternoon when the final seven events are held.

Seven events were run off Tuesday afternoon. Each event proved close and exciting. Louis Greensburg, ace century runner, captured the 100-yard dash. He broke the tempo in 10-4-5 seconds. Francis Wanio heavyweight javelin, 131 feet 6 inches to capture this event.

Mike DeCarbo threw the javelin better than 135 feet but fouled. Scamgram made a nice cast to the 440-yard dash. The time was 35-4-5 seconds. Francis Wanio easily took first place in the high jump with a jump of 5 feet 2 inches. Andy Lasky took first in the shot put event. The distance was 40 feet 9 inches. Earl K. Smith and J. Brackman, surprised by taking first place in the mile. Luther Brown came back strong in the last lap to finish second.

Louis Greensburg and Andy Lasky were tied for first place in the 120-yard hurdles event. The time was 14-7. The entire seven events were of an interesting nature. The final event was the standing 400.

The standing 400 of the different classes follows: Junior B, 29 points; Senior B, second, 18; sophomore B, 14; Junior A, fourth 11 points; senior A, fifth, 2 points; sophomore A, sixth, 2 points.

The meet will be concluded this afternoon with several events to be run off today: 220-yard dash, half mile run, soccer jump, discus throw, 120-yard high hurdles, pole vault and the mile relay.

Francis Wanio and Andy Lasky are fighting for the high point scoring trophy which will be given to the athlete scoring the most points the meet. Both athletes are on top. The class winning the meet will receive a loving cup. Faculty Manager Ralph H. Gardner stated.

BEAVER FALLS, May 6.—The Annual Beaver County Intercollegiate Track and Field Meet will be held next Saturday at Revet Stadium in Beaver Falls. This event is sponsored by the Department of Athletics at Geneva College, which A. C. Edgecombe is director. The schools to be entered Saturday are high schools from Beaver Falls, Rochester, New Brighton, Middleburg Heights, Cuyahoga Falls, Akron, and Columbus, representing Lincoln High, Ellicott City, are favored with Ellicott City being a strong contender.

Titan-Alligator Track Meet Saturday Will Be Very Close

Special To The News.—NEW WILMINGTON, Pa., May 6.—If comparative records mean anything, Westminster and Allegheny track teams should stage a thrilling duel at Meadville on Saturday when the two old rivals meet. The Titans have an 43-42 victory over Allegheny to their credit, but the Alligators have a top-sized 103-22 victory over Westminster in the two mile race of the season.

Allegheny appears to be stronger than Westminster in the two mile mile shot put, discus, and quarter mile. Westminster seems to have the edge in shot high hurdles, low hurdles, half mile, high jump, and hammer throw. This would give each team superiority in five of the 21 events. The remaining five may go either way, depending upon the condition of the men.

It is obvious, then, that the meet will go to the team which can take the most points in the doubtful event. In 100 yard dash, 220-yard dash, javelin, pole vault, and broad jump.

Herb Werall, Allegheny has one of the best distance men in the district. He should make the two mile in 10 minutes and a few seconds with good weather conditions. Saturday's distance race will all press him hard, however.

Brownlee, Titan hurdles and hammer star, should tally in his favor events. He topped the high timber in 13 seconds at the Ohio Relays on Saturday. The team of Allegheny made the 120-yard high in 16-6-10 seconds against Wash-Jeff. Brownlee's time for the 120-yard high hurdles is 13-5 seconds. The low hurdles are Saturday, at that time, had not been a 200-yard straightaway.

Cap Louis Bergeron of Westminster together with Homer, a senior, and McColl, a freshman, should force Scotcher, Allegheny in both the century and the 220-yard events. Clark of Westminster, who jumped in over six feet at Meadville last year ago, should defeat Lawry of Allegheny, who made five foot 5 inches against Wash-Jeff.

Burry Myers, Williams, Pattison and Beras in the quarter and half mile events should tally more points for the Titans. Of this group, the survivors will depend upon Harnas, Fuller, Rehtus, Cleland, football men, and Siljander, Brownlee in a weight event.
