BESSEMER LOSES TO WASHINGTON FOR SECOND TIME

Take 18-0 Defeat in Contest At New Junior High School Field

Bessemer high school went down to an 18-0 defeat before the George Washington junior high school eleven in the second contest played between the two institutions this season. Monday afternoon at the new Washington field. One of the largest crowds that has ever witnessed a junior high school game, 18-0-0.

The Gillespie-coached machine of the junior high scored its first touchdown late in the first period of the game. Burns scored a second time in the first half of the third period when he crossed the Bessemer goal after Lane had plunged to their two-yard line. Washington's attempt to gain the extra point fell short.

In every stanza of the game Bessemer exhibited a stiff defense and it was Washington that took of getting through the line that the Gillespie machine can credit its victory to.

Washington defeated the Bessemer boys by a 6-0 count two weeks ago in the game at the Bessemer field. Following is the summary:

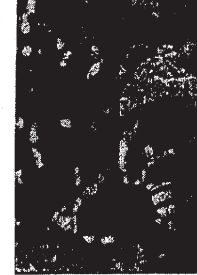
